



I regularly learn about things after meetings have happened and decisions were made or voted on. -Our government should fix our cities current issues before making decisions that will exasperating problems that already exist and aren't being taken seriously. For example, the issues with vagrants living at the campground, drugs, poaching, illegal activity that happens on the trails that I see from my home (and others on other trails see). I've tried reporting these things and nothing is ever done about it. Yet, they are in the process of connecting all of these trails to make it easier for these problems to keep happening, and get worse.

My backyard looks out onto what would be the back of the City Center, and I'm terrified of what it might look like from the back if not well-thought out, with rules and regulations enforced.

Other than that idea, something our citizens can utilize, entertainment options (movie theater, splash pad/ice rink) or more food options for our citizens.




